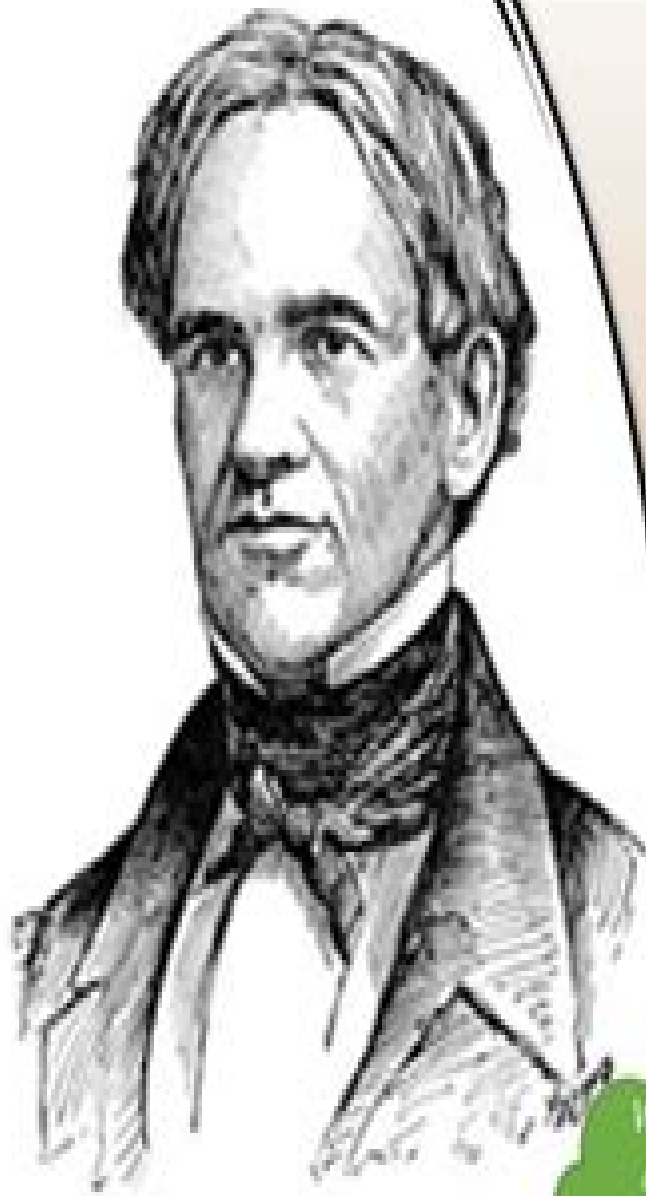

Horace Mann (1796-1859)

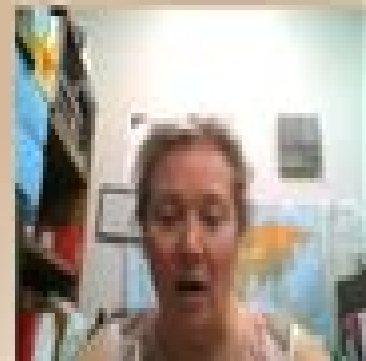
"Father of American Education"



- Spokesperson for the common school movement in his state
 - Establish public schools paid for & controlled by local government
 - Non-sectarian (i.e. non-religious)
 - Teach democratic principles
 - Normal Schools for teacher training (UNCP's foundations)
 - COMMON learning experience for ALL children regardless of class
- Fought to increase public support for universal public education and raise awareness of educational problems
 - Education as an avenue to discipline and & socialize children
 - "Equality" for ALL <=> meritocracy
 - Build character & instill certain values
 - obedience
