

PARADOX

DEFINITION

A paradox is a statement or concept that seems self-contradictory or logically unacceptable, yet might possess an underlying truth. It often highlights inconsistencies within accepted beliefs, revealing that our understanding of reality is incomplete or nuanced.

EXAMPLES

- **The Liar Paradox:** "This statement is false." If the statement is true, then it must be false as stated, but if it is false, then it must be true.
- **Sorites Paradox:** If you remove one grain of sand from a heap, you still have a heap. If you keep removing single grains, when is it no longer a heap?

The Emergence of Protolanguage Michael A. Arbib, Derek Bickerton, 2010-01-01. Somewhere and somehow in the 5 to 7 million years since the last common ancestors of humans and the great apes, our ancestors got language. The authors of this volume all agree that there was no single mutation or cultural innovation that took our ancestors directly from a limited system of a few vocalizations, primarily innate, and gestures, some learned, to language. They further agree to use the term protolanguage for the beginnings of an open system of symbolic communication that provided the bridge to the use of fully expressive languages rich in both lexicon and grammar. But here consensus ends, and the theories presented here range from the compositional view that protolanguage was based primarily on words akin to the nouns and verbs etc. we know today, with only syntax lacking, to the holophrastic view that protolanguage used protowords which had no meaningful subunits which might nonetheless refer to complex but significantly recurrent events. The present volume does not decide the matter, but it does advance our understanding. The lack of any direct archaeological record of protolanguage might seem to raise insuperable difficulties. However, this volume exhibits the diversity of methodologies that can be brought to bear in developing datasets that can be used to advance the debate. [Semantic Singularities](#) Keith Simmons, 2018. This book aims to provide a solution to the semantic paradoxes. It argues for a unified solution to the paradoxes generated by our concepts of denotation, predicate extension, and truth. The solution makes two main claims. The first is that our semantic expressions denote extensions and are true and false context-sensitively. The second, inspired by a brief tantalizing remark of Gödel's, is that these expressions are significant everywhere except for

certain singularities in analogy with division by zero A formal theory of singularities is presented and applied to a wide variety of versions of the definability paradoxes Russell's paradox and the Liar paradox Keith Simmons argues that the singularity theory satisfies the following desiderata it recognizes that the proper setting of the semantic paradoxes is natural language not regimented formal languages it minimizes any revision to our semantic concepts it respects as far as possible Tarski's intuition that natural languages are universal it responds adequately to the threat of revenge paradoxes and it preserves classical logic and semantics Simmons draws out the consequences of the singularity theory for deflationary views of our semantic concepts and concludes that if we accept the singularity theory we must reject deflationism
