### DATE-BOY

Date Boy fits a modern human skull, but some features look more like those of an *archaic* human species, the Neanderthal. It has long been thought that *Homo sapiens* wiped out our evolutionary cousins, but Date Boy suggests something else may have happened between the two species.



## ASIA

### THE WOMAN FROM TAM PA LING

The woman from Tam Pa Ling died in northern Laos 63,000 years ago. As biologists had believed that humans spread out of Africa by hugging the coast, her discovery indicates a different path of migration.



## AFRICA

### OMOH

Omoh died when 100 is his twenties, but he is the oldest member of our species found anywhere in the world. His remains are 195,000 years old, yet he looked like a modern human.



## AMERICAS

### EVA OF NAHARON

Eva of Naharon was discovered in 2008. Her remains are older than any other in the Americas and have changed what we know about the arrival of the first people on the double continent.



## AUSTRALIA

### MUNGO MAN

Mungo Man was covered in ochre when he was buried. It is some of the earliest evidence of spirituality anywhere in the world. Modern-day Aboriginal people use the same ochre in their ceremonies today.
