Six South African and Nigerian dramatic texts by Yael Farber, Mark Fleishman, Athol Fugard, Femi Osofisan and Wole Soyinka are analysed through the thematic lens of resistance, revolution, reconciliation and mourning. The opening chapters focus on plays that mobilize Greek tragedy to inspire political change, discussing how Sophocles' heroine Antigone is reconfigured as a freedom fighter and how Euripides' Dionysos is transformed into a revolutionary leader. Against George Steiner's famous claim that tragedy has died, this book demonstrates that Greek tragedy holds relevance today. But it also reveals that adaptations do more than simply keeping the texts they draw on alive through adaptation; playwrights open up a space for politics.
