Yakushev, 2012-09-14 Over the last few decades many studies have focused on the oxygen depletion of coastal and oceanic waters An understanding of the processes involved is fundamental to assess the effects of global and climatic changes and to support an ecosystem approach to adaptive environmental management for coastal seas and ocean basins This timely book presents the state of the art of our knowledge of the nature and chemical structure of redox interfaces in a marine water column oxygen depletion and connected processes The structures of the redox layers including the distribution of certain parameters and microbiological features are described in detail The volume also covers studies devoted to the interannual variability of some oxygen depleted systems modeling and new developments in observation techniques In addition it identifies remaining gaps in our knowledge of the cycling of chemical elements in changing redox conditions The chapters are based on extensive observational data collected by the authors during sea and shore expeditions on archive data and on a broad range of scientific literature

An Assessment of Assessments , 2009 Despite the central role oceans play in the economic environmental and social affairs of the planet s 6 7 billion inhabitants significant gaps exist in our understanding and management of the complex processes at work from the global climate system to the water cycle and circulation of nutrients to changes affecting marine habitats In addition the vastness of the world s oceans have for far too long been perceived as impervious and indestructible to human impact To deal with this situation improved monitoring and observation practices regular assessments to provide a deeper understanding of the status and trends of environmental changes and the know how and ability to prevent mitigate and adapt to these changes are urgently required The UN General Assembly in 2005 recommended that a regular process for the global reporting and assessment of the state of the marine environment including its socio economic aspects Regular Process be initiated The UN Environment Programme UNEP and the Intergovernmental Oceanographic Commission of UNESCO IOC UNESCO were asked to serve as the lead agencies in the start up phase that came to be known as the Assessment of Assessments AoA Under the AoA an Expert Group have developed options and a framework for such a Regular Process which can serve as the

The Eastern Mediterranean as a Laboratory Basin for the Assessment of Contrasting Ecosystems P.M. Malanotte-Rizzoli, Valery N. Eremeev, 2012-12-06 This book is the outcome of a NATO Advanced Research Workshop on The Eastern Mediterranean as a laboratory basin for the assessment of contrasting ecosystems that was held in Kiev Ukraine March 23-27 1998 The scientific rationale of the workshop can be summarized as follows The Eastern Mediterranean is the most nutrient impoverished and oligotrophic large water body known There is a well defined eastward trend in nutrient ratios over the entire Mediterranean that starts at the Gibraltar Straits and through the western basin proceeds to the Ionian and Levantine Seas Supply of nutrients to the entire Mediterranean is limited by inputs from the North Atlantic and various river systems along the sea The unique feature of the Mediterranean is the presence of an eastward longitudinal trend in available nitrate phosphate ratios This apparently induces a west to east variation in the structure of the pelagic food web and trophic interactions In this context the Mediterranean and in particular its Eastern basin provides probably a unique platform to explore the hypotheses related to the suggested phosphate limitation on production and to the shift between microbial and classical modes of operation of the photic food web The major exception of the overall oligotrophic nature of the Eastern Mediterranean is the highly eutrophic system of the Northern Adriatic Sea Here during the last two decades the discharges of the northern rivers especially of the Po together with municipal sewage have led to a very marked increase of nutrients and subsequent important eutrophication events
