

Eighteenth-Century Fiction and the Law of Property Wolfram Schmidgen, 2002-10-17 In Eighteenth Century Fiction and the Law of Property Wolfram Schmidgen draws on legal and economic writings to analyse the description of houses landscapes and commodities in eighteenth century fiction His study argues that such descriptions are important to the British imagination of community By making visible what it means to own something they illuminate how competing concepts of property define the boundaries of the individual of social community and of political systems In this way Schmidgen recovers description as a major feature of eighteenth century prose and he makes his case across a wide range of authors including Daniel Defoe Henry Fielding William Blackstone Adam Smith and Ann Radcliffe The book s most incisive theoretical contribution lies in its careful insistence on the unity of the human and the material in Schmidgen's argument persons and things are inescapably entangled This approach produces fresh insights into the relationship between law literature and The Cultural Politics of Opera, 1720-1742 Thomas McGeary, 2024-09-24 Explores the intersection of the world economics of opera literature and partisan politics to show how Italian opera was put to use in the culture wars of the day This last of a trilogy of books on opera and politics in Britain examines the cultural politics of opera during the ministerial reign of Sir Robert Walpole from 1720 to 1742 The book explores the intersection of the world of opera literature and partisan politics to show how Italian opera with its associations with the court ministry and Britain's social political elite was put to use in the culture wars of the day how Italian opera was used for partisan political advantage how political work could be accomplished by means of opera It shows that attacks on opera had ulterior targets The book surveys a range of often overlooked verse and prints to show how critique or satire of opera were a means for oppositional writers to delegitimize the Walpole ministry Polemicists framed opera as a consequence of the corruption luxury and False Taste generated by Walpole's ministry It closes in the watershed year 1742 Handel had produced the last of his Italian operas the previous year Walpole fell from power and Alexander Pope published the last book of his Dunciad project Monstrous Society David Collings, 2009 Monstrous Society problematizes competing representations of reciprocity in England in the decades around 1800 It argues that in the eighteenth century moral economy power is divided between official authority and the counter power of plebeians This tacit mutual understanding comes under attack when influential political thinkers such as Edmund Burke Jeremy Bentham and T R Malthus attempt to discipline the social body to make state power immune from popular response But once negated counter power persists even if in the demands of a debased inhuman body Such a response is writ large in Gothic

Anglicans began to use a much more complicated form of ritual involving vestments candles and incense This Anglo Catholic movement was vehemently opposed by evangelicals and dissenters who saw this as the vanguard of full blown popery The disputed buildings objects and art works were regarded by one side as idolatrous and by the other as sacred and beautiful expressions of devotion Dominic Janes seeks to understand the fierce passions that were unleashed by the contended practices and artifacts passions that found expression in litigation in rowdy demonstrations and even in physical violence During this period Janes observes the wider culture was preoccupied with the idea of pollution caused by improper sexuality The Anglo Catholics had formulated a spiritual ethic that linked goodness and beauty Their opponents saw this visual worship as dangerously sensual In effect this sacred material culture was seen as a sexual fetish The origins of this understanding Janes shows lay in radical circles often in the context of the production of anti Catholic pornography which titillated with the contemplation of images of licentious priests nuns and monks Faces of History Donald R.
