Maclure of New Harmony Leonard Warren, 2009-06-29 Maclure of New Harmony follows the twists and turns of William Maclure s intriguing life A native Scotsman Maclure 1763 1840 became a merchant made a fortune and retired in his early thirties Then his life became interesting Fascinated by the study of geology Maclure did fieldwork throughout Europe before traveling to the United States where he completed the first geological survey of his adopted nation and published a detailed color geological map one reason he is known as the Father of American Geology Maclure s travels sharpened his convictions about social justice and led him to a life of social radicalism He founded progressive schools to educate the children of the working classes and in 1820 he joined forces with Robert Owen to found New Harmony the utopian community in Indiana Ever restless Maclure later moved to Mexico where he watched his hopes for the new republic founder
