Wheeler,2011-11-01 In this ambitious book Kenneth Wheeler revises our understanding of the nineteenth century American Midwest by reconsidering an institution that was pivotal in its making the small college During the antebellum decades Americans built a remarkable number of colleges in the Midwest that would help cultivate their regional identity Through higher education the values of people living north and west of the Ohio River formed the basis of a new Midwestern culture Cultivating Regionalism shows how college founders built robust institutions of higher learning in this socially and ethnically diverse milieu Contrary to conventional wisdom these colleges were much different than their counterparts in the East and South not derivative of them as many historians suggest Manual labor programs for instance nurtured a Midwestern zeal for connecting mind and body And the coeducation of men and women at these schools exploded gender norms throughout the region Students emerging from these colleges would ultimately shape the ethos of the Progressive era and in large numbers take up scientific investigation as an expression of their egalitarian production oriented training More than a history of these antebellum schools this elegantly conceived work exposes the interplay in regionalism between thought and action who antebellum Midwesterners imagined they were and how they built their colleges in distinct ways

American students at Oberlin College Following the Reconstruction era Oberlin College mirrored the rest of society as it reduced its commitment to black students by treating them as less than equals of their white counterparts By the middle of the twentieth century black and white student activists partially reclaimed the Oberlin legacy by refusing to be defined by race Generations of Oberlin students plus a minority of faculty and staff rekindled the college's commitment to racial equality by 1970 In time black separatism in its many forms replaced the integrationist ethic on campus as African Americans sought to chart their own destiny and advance curricular change Oberlin's is not a story of unbroken progress but rather of irony of contradictions and integrity of myth and reality and of imperfections Baumann takes readers directly to the original sources by including thirty complete documents from the Oberlin College Archives This richly illustrated volume is an important contribution to the college's 175th anniversary celebration of its distinguished history for it convincingly documents how Oberlin wrestled over the meaning of race and the destiny of black people in American society *Gender and Education*

Coeds Ruining the Nation Julia

Bullock, 2019-08-28 In the late 1800s Japan introduced a new sex segregated educational system Boys would be prepared to enter a rapidly modernizing public sphere while girls trained to become good wives and wise mothers who would contribute to the nation by supporting their husbands and nurturing the next generation of imperial subjects When this system was replaced by a coeducational model during the American Occupation following World War II adults raised with gender specific standards were afraid coeducation would cause moral problems even societal collapse By contrast young people generally greeted coeducation with greater composure This is the first book in English to explore the arguments for and against coeducation as presented in newspaper and magazine articles cartoons student authored school newsletters and roundtable discussions published in the Japanese press as these reforms were being implemented It complicates the notion of the postwar years as a moment of rupture highlighting prewar experiments with coeducation that belied objections that the practice was a foreign imposition and therefore unnatural for Japanese culture It also illustrates a remarkable degree of continuity between prewar and postwar models of femininity arguing that Occupation era guarantees of equal educational opportunity were ultimately repurposed toward a gendered division of labor that underwrote the postwar project of economic recovery Finally it excavates discourses of gender and sexuality underlying the moral panic surrounding coeducation to demonstrate that claims of rampant sexual deviance and other concerns were employed as disciplinary mechanisms to reinforce an ideology of harmonious gender complementarity and to dissuade women from pursuing conventionally masculine prerogatives
