Dualism and Function: Two Postulates

In order to put the promised theory into play, I must first pitch two fundamental postulates. I ask the reader's indulgence for not examining their sources or derivations now; the cogency both of the postulates themselves and of the late nineteenth-century thinking that conceived them improves if a modern interpretation precedes the historical study—an unusual reversal of conventional ordering, to be sure, but one demanded by the especially treacherous nature of the ideas.

1.1 THE USES OF DUALISM

The first postulate reads as follows:

POSTULATE 1. Sonorous materials of major-minor tonality can be organized and developed in two opposed directions, creating sets of dualistically paired tonal concepts.

By *sonorous materials* I mean structures defined by relationships among pitches (e.g., scales, keys, chords). That the concepts these materials manifest are "organized" and "developed" rather than "discovered" and "observed" emphasizes the active role that the listening mind plays in making sense out of music. I do not claim that tonal music dualizes naturally, that duality so inheres in tonal music that one is compelled to take it as a fact of nature. Such propositions, fashionable in the nineteenth century, have no comfortable accommodation in the empirical world and now reside in the ether of faith and dogma. I therefore renounce them for the present work.
