The Virgin, who is clearly standing up, also features the bright of the column, a capital and there are the Child on her lap, her feet are in full. The donors, who are kneeling, have been removed at the top and bottom, so that we lose the lower height. It is extremely difficult after so much time to determine why the painting was mutilated in this way. The darker colors in the man's right, and almost all the red drapery in the woman's left, seem to be original, at least in part, and are thus likely to be remnants of the person who originally stood alongside the donors. This interpretation was first suggested by Friedländer in 1903. The hypothesis that the three paintings originally belonged to a single fixed panel is strengthened by the fact that the edges of the portraits, the three panels are three fragments of the original vertical planks of the painting, which were linked by internal dowel pins.⁴ We might, therefore, be imagining a composition similar to the Virgin with donor in Olona (cat. 101), but with an extra figure on the opposite side. The Virgin with two men on the Uffizi Altarpiece (cat. 84) is an interesting variant of this type. Further technical examination may confirm this hypothesis. There was a little more space above the Virgin; the original panel must have measured roughly 100 x 100 cm.

The Virgin is represented in an unusual panel construction, backed by two brown wooden columns, suggesting windows between the hands with the Christ Child on her arm below a cloth of honour in red and black bands. The construction runs obliquely to
