Pause, Christoph Schwarze, Arnim von Stechow, Götz Wienold, 1995-03-09 This book contains a selection of the papers given at an international conference at the University of Konstanz Germany in 1991 All contributions relate to the assumption that lexical knowledge plays a central role in the organization of language inasmuch as the components or modules of grammar come together and interact in the lexicon Originating in various traditions of linguistic thought however the individual papers reflect differing interests and are based upon different conceptions of the lexicon its status and interfaces There is the position of current generative linguistics which aims at accounting for structural properties of the lexicon within syntactic theory There is also the perspective of model theoretical semantics where borderline phenomena between lexical semantics and the semantics of sentence and text receive particular attention Still another group of papers directly discusses problems of lexical semantics focussing on representational and conceptual aspects of word meanings The notion of a two level semantics as well as cross linguistic analyses are characteristic of these contributions The book closes with a comparative and historical study of lexical evolution      **Morphological Length and Prosodically Defective**

**Morphemes** Eva Zimmermann, 2017 This work examines specific sound changes that cannot be explained by phonological

means alone but crucially rely on morphological information. It offers a unified theoretical account of these phenomena as well as a rich database of attested patterns in the world's languages.

*Standard Negation* Matti Miestamo, 2008-08-22. This book is the first cross-linguistic study of clausal negation based on an extensive and systematic language sample. Methodological issues, especially sampling, are discussed at length. Standard negation, the basic structural means languages have for negating declarative verbal main clauses, is typologized from a new perspective, paying attention to structural differences between affirmatives and negatives. In symmetric negation, affirmative and negative structures show no differences except for the presence of the negative marker *s*, whereas in asymmetric negation, there are further structural differences, i.e., asymmetries. A distinction is made between constructional and paradigmatic asymmetry: in the former, the addition of the negative marker *s* is accompanied by further structural differences in comparison to the corresponding affirmative; and in the latter, the correspondences between the members of verbal etc. paradigms used in affirmatives and negatives are not one-to-one. Cross-cutting the constructional/paradigmatic distinction, asymmetric negation can be further divided into subtypes according to the nature of the asymmetry. Standard negation structures found in the 297 sample languages are exemplified and discussed in detail. The frequencies of the different types and some typological correlations are also examined. Functional motivations are proposed for the structural types. Symmetric negatives are language internally analogous to the linguistic structure of the affirmative, and asymmetric negatives are language externally analogous to different asymmetries between affirmation and negation on the functional level. Relevant diachronic issues are also discussed. The book is of interest to language typologists, descriptive linguists, and to all linguists interested in negation.

**Locative Predications in Chadic Languages** Zygmunt Frajzyngier, 2024-10-10. This book demonstrates that the grammatical systems of individual languages encode unique semantic structures. Zygmunt Frajzyngier examines these semantic structures with particular reference to how languages convey information about the location of an entity or an event and the movements of an entity in space, drawing on data from eight typologically distinct languages that belong to three branches of the Chadic family. These languages were chosen because some display locative expressions with semantic and syntactic characteristics that have not been observed or described in other languages, most importantly in the coding of what Frajzyngier calls the locative domain in the grammatical system. The volume shows that utterances in a given language are determined by the functions encoded in the grammatical system and by where those functions are encoded; it further shows that syntactic properties and the existence of some lexical items in the language are also determined by those same functions.

Coordination Relations in the Languages of Europe and Beyond Caterina Mauri, 2008-11-03. This book examines the coding of the three coordination relations of combination, contrast, and alternative between states of affairs on the basis of a 74-language sample with special focus on the languages spoken in Europe. It constitutes the first systematic inquiry so far conducted on the cross-linguistic coding of coordination as defined in cognitive and pragmatic terms. This research shows

that the and but or coding system which is typical of Central Western Europe appears to be extremely rare outside Europe where a great variation in the coding of coordination is attested This cross linguistic variation however is not random but is crucially constrained by the interaction of economic principles with the semantic properties of the individual relations expressed A fine grained functional systematization of coordination is proposed and described by means of implicational patterns and semantic maps This work brings together a broad cross linguistic perspective and a detailed semantic analysis largely based on new and comparable data collected by means of questionnaires all accessible in the appendix of the book It represents the first systematic attempt towards a unified typology of coordination relations

**A Grammar of Giziga** Erin Shay, 2021-01-18 This is the first broad detailed grammar of the Giziga language which belongs to the Chadic branch of the Afro Asiatic language family The language is spoken in parts of the Far North Region of the Republic of Cameroon and can be divided into two dialects Giziga and Northern Giziga with about 80 000 native speakers in total This volume describes the Giziga dialect occasionally referring to the Northern variety and aims to provide new information about this and other Afro Asiatic languages for further research in linguistics history anthropology sociology and related fields The book will also be a tool helping Giziga speakers preserve their language history and culture for future generations

A Grammar of Miya Russell G. Schuh, 1998 A Grammar of Miya describes a language of the Chadic family spoken in Northern Nigeria This is the first documentation of Miya aside from word lists The grammar describes all aspects of the language Of particular typological interest are the tone system a terraced level system in which tone operates over multi syllabic domains and word order which is VXS in many contexts
