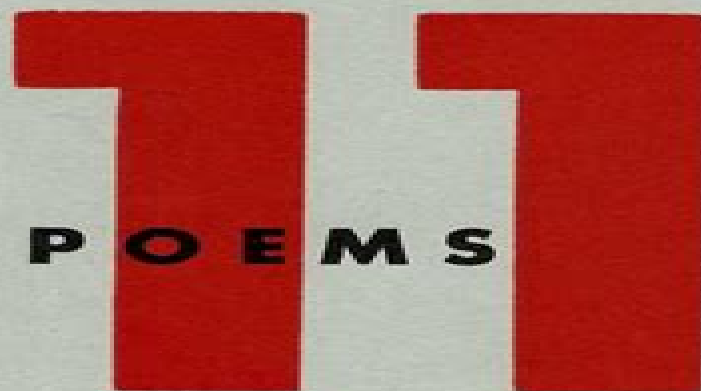

**Eleven Poems on the Same Theme** Robert Penn Warren, 1942      **Ghostly Parallels** Randolph Runyon, 2006 America's most eminent man of letters in his later years and certainly one of the greatest Southern writers Robert Penn Warren has increasingly come to be known for his poetry *Ghostly Parallels* is a close examination of the heart of his poetic corpus the eight collections published between 1935 and 1976 *Thirty Six Poems* *Eleven Poems on the Same Theme* *Promises You* *Emperors and Others* *Tale of Time* *Incarnations* *Or Else* and *Can I See Arcturus from Where I Stand* *Ghostly Parallels* shows how Warren constructed collections of poems based on common subjects and contexts and also contends that while the poems are distinctive taken together they reveal intricate patterns of theme imagery and diction within explicit sequences Runyon demonstrates that Warren's collections are integrated well crafted wholes and each poem references its predecessor sometimes in intriguingly self-referential ways Runyon shows that despite the many changes in diction tone and subject that Warren underwent in his long career his concern for writing his poems in such a way that they could reach out beyond themselves to other poems remained remarkably constant In the arrangement Warren gave them his poems form *ghostly parallels* an expression that appears in *The Return* An Elegy where they refer to the railroad tracks that bring the poet home to his dying mother This return to the mother is a persistent leitmotif in the poems and forms the other major theme of this study Warren's personal poetic myth in which such images as golden light and mirror images are signs of the mother's presence as both Danae mother of Perseus and Medusa whom Perseus confronted Through pursuing sequential patterns as well as echoes and myth *Ghostly Parallels* brings a wealth of insights to the work of this prolific novelist critic and essayist An important guide for undergraduate and graduate students alike *Ghostly Parallels* will also appeal to anyone with an interest in Robert Penn Warren and southern literature      **Reinventing the South** Mark Royden Winchell, 2006 Surveys the revivification and reinvention of southern culture and literature and the influence of the Agrarians Fugitives New Critics and popular writers including John Gould Fletcher Robert Penn Warren Monroe K Spears Walter Sullivan William Faulkner Tennessee Williams William Humphrey and Cormac McCarthy Provided by publisher      **Cultivating Cooperation** Raymond A. Young, 1995 As one of the most successful farm organizations in the United States the Missouri Farmers Association brought together farm clubs from all over the state to serve as the central body through which farmer owned businesses could compete with investor owned businesses In *Cultivating Cooperation* Raymond A Young follows the fascinating history of MFA from its grass roots beginning in a schoolhouse in 1914 through the upheaval that led to only the second leadership change in the organization's history in 1979 William Hirth was responsible for the early success of MFA At the age of fifteen Hirth became interested in farming and started lecturing on the benefits of building a cooperative of farm clubs He continued to advocate this idea by publishing *The Missouri Farmer* a magazine that informed subscribers on legislative issues and farm club news and later became MFA's house organ Hirth believed that the farm clubs should capitalize not only on the economic

advantages of joining together as a cooperative but on the political and social advantages as well Upon Hirth's death in 1940 Fred Heinkel took over leadership of MFA Under his guidance the cooperative grew at a feverish rate Supply companies such as oil refineries feed mills and seed plants were acquired or built whenever it proved advantageous to the farmers A sister cooperative was created to expand into neighboring states and a national alliance was created to establish a stronger representation in Washington D C MFA was also instrumental in securing a four year medical school in its hometown of Columbia in order to ensure medical care for farmers and their families in rural areas In addition MFA has played a role in helping Third World countries develop cooperatives of their own With intimate knowledge of the organization Raymond Young involves the reader in the intricacies of the formation and development of the Missouri Farmers Association enlivening his account with liberal use of anecdotes from the pages of *The Missouri Farmer* An introduction by Michael L Cook places the story of MFA within the context of the history of the cooperative movement nationwide Students and scholars of Missouri history as well as farmers and those interested in agriculture will find this comprehensive examination of MFA an invaluable resource

**The Fourth Ghost** Robert H. Brinkmeyer, 2009 In the 1949 classic *Killers of the Dream* Lillian Smith described three racial ghosts haunting the mind of the white South the black woman with whom the white man often had sexual relations the rejected child from a mixed race coupling and the black mammy whom the white southern child first loves but then must reject In this groundbreaking work Robert H Brinkmeyer Jr extends Smith's work by adding a fourth ghost lurking in the psyche of the white South the specter of European Fascism He explores how southern writers of the 1930s and 1940s responded to Fascism and most tellingly to the suggestion that the racial politics of Nazi Germany had a special problematic relevance to the South and its segregated social system As Brinkmeyer shows nearly all white southern writers in these decades felt impelled to deal with this specter and with the implications for southern identity of the issues raised by Nazism and Fascism Their responses varied widely ranging from repression and denial to the repulsion of self recognition With penetrating insight Brinkmeyer examines the work of writers who contemplated the connection between the authoritarianism and racial politics of Nazi Germany and southern culture He shows how white southern writers both those writing cultural criticism and those writing imaginative literature turned to Fascist Europe for

images analogies and metaphors for representing and understanding the conflict between traditional and modern cultures that they were witnessing in Dixie Brinkmeyer considers the works of a wide range of authors of varying political stripes the Nashville Agrarians W J Cash Lillian Smith William Alexander Percy Thomas Wolfe William Faulkner Katherine Anne Porter Carson McCullers Robert Penn Warren and Lillian Hellman He argues persuasively that by engaging in their works the vital contemporary debates about totalitarianism and democracy these writers reconfigured their understanding not only of the South but also of themselves as southerners and of the nature and significance of their art The magnum opus of a distinguished scholar The Fourth Ghost offers a stunning reassessment of the cultural and political orientation of southern literature by examining a major and heretofore unexplored influence on its development

**The Braided Dream** Randolph Paul Runyon, 2021-12-14 Robert Penn Warren's reputation as a poet though always considerable has soared in the last decade as indicated by his recent selection as America's first poet laureate The Braided Dream is one of the first book length studies of the poetry that has led to Warren's recent rise to eminence and the first to consider his final collection Altitudes and Extensions In a communicable jargon free style that will appeal to the nonacademic reader as well as the serious scholar Randolph Paul Runyon provides a detailed and illuminating guide to a body of poetry that despite its greatness has until now seemed resistant to full understanding Every poem of Warren's last four sequences Now and Then Being Here Rumor Verified and Altitudes and Extensions is given a close reading with a precise laying out of words phrases and recurring images that not only enrich the texture of the poetry but are themselves the texture Runyon demonstrates the relevance of Freud's concept of the dream work of the unconscious to a reading of this tightly interwoven poetry He shows how Warren's poems assume additional meanings by the poet's very arrangement of them deepening his thesis by arguing that poems eat poems as each reuses and reconceptualizes the imagery of its predecessor frequently with ironic or parodic effect

**The Poetic Vision of Robert Penn Warren** Victor H. Strandberg, 2021-12-14 Though it has won the Pulitzer Prize the National Book Award and the Bollingen Prize the poetry of Robert Penn Warren still is not widely or well understood In this study Victor H Strandberg redresses this imbalance by providing a comprehensive survey of the poetic canon of this gifted complex and much neglected poet Warren writes in the tradition of Western poets concerned with the painful experience of a forced one way passage from innocence into the world's stew of time and loss This passage Strandberg explains results for Warren in bifurcation of the self into warring segments a clean idealistic surface ego and a polluted undiscovered self in the unconscious Revelation of the dirty part of human personality is tellingly evoked in many of Warren's major works As the poet's vision expands however these conflicting elements are unified in a mystic osmosis of being whereby the world which once provoked fear and disgust may now be totally loved In addition to close analysis both of individual poems and of the poet's overall development Strandberg reviews critical opinion of Warren's poetry over the last three decades and assesses his place among fellow poets Both as prophecy and as art he concludes Robert Penn Warren's poetry is so significant

Cutrer,1984-06-01 Parnassus on the Mississippi is a history of the short lived yet remarkable productive epoch when in the words of C Vann Woodward the center of the avant garde of American literary criticism shifted temporarily to the banks of the Mississippi at Baton Rouge Beginning with the establishment of the Southern Review at Louisiana State University in 1935 Baton Rouge became the home not only to a brand of criticism that would reshape the teaching of literature in America but also to a community of scholars and artists that included Cleanth Brooks Robert Penn Warren Katherine Anne Porter Robert Lowell Jean Stafford and Peter Taylor Thomas Cutrer chronicles how the Southern Review created in the midst of the Depression by the largess of Louisiana governor Huey P Long quickly rose to the position of the finest American literary journal of its day Under the joint editorship of Cleanth Brooks and Robert Penn Warren the journal published criticism poetry and short fiction by writers as eminent as R P Blackmur Kenneth Burke T S Elliot and Wallace Stevens The editors also encouraged and published works by such young talented and at the time unknown writers as Nelson Algren Randall Jarrell Mary McCarthy and Eudora Welty During these same years Brooks and Warren collaborated on three textbooks An Approach to Literature Understanding Poetry and Understanding Fiction which would revolutionize college English by emphasizing the study of a literary work itself in concrete and precise terms over the study of the biographical historical and moral issues surrounding it Brooks also wrote his influential critical works Modern Poetry and Tradition and The Well Wrought Urn while Warren wrote two novels and some of his finest poems and stories and absorbed material from the political tumult around him for the work that would later become All the King s Men The stature of the Southern Review and the vitality of the literary community that it spawned were both to a great extent born of the dedication and creativity of Books and Warren but in other very tangible ways they were also by products of the ambition of Huey Long ironically it was the actions of one of the assassinated governor s loyalists that brought an end to Baton Rouge s time as a Parnassus After a financial scandal rocked the university a reform administration was appointed which in its zeal to curb a runaway budget stopped the funding for the review Soon after Brooks and Warren both left the faculty The Southern Review itself would lie dormant until its revival two decades later *Quarterly Review* ,1947 Includes section Some Michigan books [The Oxford Encyclopedia of American Literature](#) Jay Parini,2004 The Encyclopedia of American Literature gathers together 350 essays from over 190 leading scholars on the whole of American literature from European discovery to the present At the core of the Encyclopedia lie 250 essays on poets playwrights essayists and novelists Figures such as Whitman Melville Faulkner Frost and Morrison are discussed in detail with each examined in the context of his or her times an assessment of the writer s current reputation a bibliography of major works and a list of major critical and biographical works about the writer Fifty entries on major works such as Moby Dick Song of Myself Walden The Great Gatsby The Waste Land Their Eyes Were Watching God Death of a Salesman and Beloved place the work in its historical context and offer a range of possibilities with regard to critical approach The Encyclopedia also contains essays on literary movements periods and themes pulling together a broad range of
