Jones, 1993 This book examines the factors affecting educational planning in a developing society especially in an area bound by strict tribal traditions and categorized as poorly developed and resourced North West Frontier Province of Pakistan International interests and internal power conflicts add to the difficulties and uniqueness of such planning The book is cross disciplinary although it focuses on planning for education It breaks new ground by proposing theories of change which are rarely considered in educational planning and questions the role of formal education in relation to development and suggests that various systems of education exist in the society under study It proposes that analysis and consideration of social structures such as Khanism and Maliki system Jirga and Hujra be built into planning rather than work against it or in isolation from it **Dependence, Domination and Legitimacy** Adele Mavis Ellen Jones, 1989 **The International Handbook of Educational Research in the Asia-Pacific Region** J.P. Keeves, Ryo Watanabe, 2013-11-11 The aim of the Handbook is to present readily accessible but scholarly sources of information about educational research in the Asia Pacific region The scale and scope of the Handbook is such that the articles included in it provide substantive contributions to knowledge and understanding of education in the Asia region In so doing the articles present the problems and issues facing education in the region and the findings of research conducted within the region that contribute to the resolution of these problems and issues Moreover since new problems and issues are constantly arising the articles in the Handbook also indicate the likely directions of future developments The different articles within the Handbook seek to conceptualize the problems in each specific content area under review provide an integration of the research conducted within that area the theoretical basis of the research the practical implications of the research and the contribution of the research towards the resolution of the problems identified Thus the articles do not involve the reporting of newly conducted research but rather require a synthesis of the research undertaken in a particular area with reference to the research methods employed and the theoretical frameworks on which the research is based In general the articles do not advocate a single point of view but rather present alternative points of view and comment on the debate and disagreements associated with the conduct and findings of the research Furthermore it should be noted that the Handbook is not concerned with research methodology and only considers the methods employed in inquiry in so far as the particular methods of research contribute to the effective investigation of problems and issues that have arisen in the conduct and provision of education at different levels within the region *John Frith, Scholar and Martyr* Brian Raynor, 2000 John Frith was one of the outstanding academics of his time He had a clear logical mathematical mind was highly respected and influenced many Yet in 1553 at the age of 30 he was burnt at the stake for writing books supporting doctrines of Reformation This work discusses his life *Globalisation, Employment and Education in Sri Lanka* Angela W. Little, Siri T. Hettige, 2014-05-23 Since the late 1970s Sri Lanka has undergone a socio economic transformation from protectionism

towards economic liberalisation and increasing integration into the world economy Through a systematic comparison of these periods of economic change 1956 1977 and 1977 to the present Angela W Little and Siri T Hettige examine the impact of this transformation on education youth employment and equality of opportunity in Sri Lanka The book charts Sri Lanka's shift from a predominantly agricultural economy to one dominated by services and manufacturing a reduction in unemployment rising educational and occupational levels expectations and achievements and a reduction in poverty In turn it reveals a growing role for the private sector and foreign interests in post secondary education and a modest growth in private education at the primary and secondary levels as well as widening social disparities in access to qualifications training and skills The Sri Lankan experience of and engagement with globalisation has been tempered by a long running ethnic conflict that hindered economic and social development and diverted considerable public funds into defence and war Now that the war is won the challenge is how to invest in human resource development and the fulfilment of the expectations of youth from all ethnic and social groups This challenge requires serious policy analysis the generation of more state revenues the reallocation of existing public resources and a political commitment to the winning of a sustainable peace and stability This book makes an important contribution to the broader international literature on the implications of globalisation for education policy and practice and to the interaction of exogenous and endogenous forces for educational change It deals with the tension between the high social demand for education and the growing demand for specialised skills in a changing economy As such it has a wide interdisciplinary appeal across education policy and politics Asian education South Asian society youth policy sociology of education political economy of social change and globalisation

State and Nation in South Asia Swarna Rajagopalan, 2001 What makes a national community out of a state Addressing this fundamental question Rajagopalan studies national integration from the perspective of three South Asian communities Tamilians in India Sindhis in Pakistan and Tamils in Sri Lanka that have a history of secessionism in common but with vastly different outcomes Rajagopalan investigates why integration is relatively successful in some cases Tamil Nadu less so in others Sindh and disastrous in some Sri Lanka Broadly comparative and drawing together multiple aspects of political development and nation building her imaginative exploration of the tension between state and nation gives voice to relatively disenfranchised sections of society
