Hence the role of education in their view is not merely to prepare students for a new economic reality but to prepare them instead to shape that reality in more progressive and socially just ways. This book eloquently argues that the citizenship mission of schools ought to teach students what is possible rather than

simply objectifying them as human capital being prepared for the inevitable impact of the policies determined by others

This book explores the concept that although women are breastfeeding education as mothers in the neoliberal education system they are not necessarily doing so as a self-sacrifice as one may generalize in the context of neoliberal economy. Instead, this book argues that women are doing this as a means of investment for gaining a sense of individual power which ironically reinforces patriarchal values.
